

Leadership nominations are sought

Nominations are being sought for the second Leadership Council Bluffs program.

The membership-selection committee will choose 20 participants from those nominated for the session, scheduled for October through May, said chairman Donald L. Porter.

Nominations are due Thursday for the 1990 class. The first class graduated last May.

Porter said participants would be people who have shown evidence of leadership potential, are community-development oriented and are likely to assume greater responsibility. They will be selected as representative of various segments of the community, including business, industry, professions, education and civic organizations.

Last year, the Council Bluffs Chamber of Commerce started the program to discover and identify a select group of men and women in the community who are or should become leaders. The object was to refine their leadership skills for the betterment of Council Bluffs.

Chamber of Commerce members have been told they have a unique opportunity to assist in identification of community leaders who will share the Leadership Council Bluffs experience.

Members are being asked to nominate people they believe are excellent candidates to participate in the opportunity to learn about the community and its heritage, people, inner workings and potential, and then grow into community leadership roles, participating in guiding the city's future.

Cost of the program is \$700 per participant.

The Leadership Council Bluffs schedule includes:

- Opening retreat — An introduction and welcome to the program at which community leaders will discuss their visions of Council Bluffs, followed by a seminar on leadership styles.
- Heritage Day — Visions from the Past: A tour of historical sites and insight into how our heritage relates to our current vision.
- Omaha-Council Bluffs Relationship Issue — Small-group activities and panel discussions on the relationship between the two cities, benefits and drawbacks.
- Community Development — Types of boards, volunteer and elected, and various roles and expectations for membership.
- Building Coalitions — How successful coalitions are built in business and politics, various views of power structures within the city and county, and the role of the press in community advancement.
- Beautification — Improvement projects planned and completed, including tours of several sites.
- Council Bluffs as an Economic Unit — A plenary session focusing on the economic roles of Council Bluffs and factors influencing growth.
- Graduation Retreat and Ceremonies — A chance to share what has been learned and reflect on what the future may bring.
